Since the beginning of term, a keen group of Year 6 pupils have come to the STEM room during two lunch breaks each week. They meticulously built our Lego Mindstorm EV3 robots, generously given to the school by Mrs Wagstaff. Their enthusiasm did not let up and we set about programming them.

Thanks to Mrs Foulger's early planning and Mr Mutti building our practice table to the exact dimensions required, we were now in a position to get ready for our first competition...



After learning some basics, we set to and built the components sent from the 'First (which stands FIRST for: For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology) Lego League' (FLL). This year, LEAGUE the theme was Hydrodynamics. The team of ten was chosen - the maximum allowed - and we


met three times a week. Neha led the important 'Core Values' aspect and the team learned a new word coopertition (co- operative competition). Our solution to a water problem was voted on and we worked on presenting this challenge. With increasingly careful adjustments, we attempted the robot missions.

Finally the day came, and with thanks to Mrs Sowter, travelled to Canterbury for our first ever FLL competition, up against over twenty other teams including another school in the Wishford group, St Faith's. The tension was palpable as the team set-up and watched our EV3, complete with Lego attachment, do its practised program.

Precision was everything! And yes, after careful placement by Hollyann and Luke, in front of our eyes, the robot went over, put up its hook, lifted the pipe, turned and went perfectly back to the base! The team presented beautifully (complete with model, posters and PowerPoint!) in front of judges, confidently explained the robot's design and programming when interviewed and displayed fantastic 'core values'. The team learned, were inspired and came away proud of their achievements and wearing their medals.

The robots have been fantastic, but it's the teamwork and all the children that I have had the pleasure to teach from Year 1 through to Year 6, that has made this term so very special.

Fairly limited in its detail, it nevertheless got me thinking. The hidden jewel in our crown at St David's is without question our outdoor space. Those of us who have the privilege of showing visitors around will testify to the unexpected gasps and comments when our beautiful field unfolds before them, making the stroll up the path worthwhile even on the cold, damp days.

We are thrilled that the regular grounds maintenance and clearance means that we now have more space to enjoy and laying out the new cross country course within our own site is testament to this.

The pupils are loving the regular opportunities to run and are taking the challenge of running their own 'marathon' very seriously.
