
## Julia Foulger

# **Pre- Reception**

# What a busy half term we have had in Pre-Reception!

\*\*\*\*\*\*

We have been focussing on celebrations and have learnt about fireworks, Diwali and Christmas. When learning about fireworks, we looked at colours and patterns and created our own firework paintings with glitter. We also thought about how to keep safe when watching fireworks.



We learnt about the celebration of Diwali where we made some special coconut treats and made our own diva lamps. We also learnt some special Diwali songs and used instruments when performing them.





Finally, we learnt about the first Christmas story and took part in our very first Nativity show- true stars!

What a fantastic half term the reception children have had. From looking at different celebrations to learning all about the changes in seasons. Each week in reception we focus on a different story and lots of the children's learning stems from these stimuli. Our particular favourites this half term have been the Stickman and the Gruffalo. The children absolutely loved these stories as they are familiar with them and therefore they can join in.

When reading the Gruffalo, we focused on explaining the vocabulary in the book. We looked at what an adjective is and asked the children if we could make the descriptions better. We had lots of fabulous vocabulary such as the gigantic Gruffalo and we looked at how we could describe him. The children came up with lots of different describing words and then we practised using these in a sentence.

When looking at stories we learnt about authors and the children then wanted to be become authors themselves. Children thought of their own adventures for Stickman and we even wrote our own class version of the story using the children's ideas. We went around the school grounds on a stick hunt and used these sticks to make our own stick men and stick families. The children also used these to make their own camp fires and we had a lovely time roasting pretend marshmallows.





The Stickman story led to

the children asking lots of questions about the change of seasons. In reception we love to follow the children's interests as we know this is how the children learn best. We learnt all about autumn and looked at lots of different coloured leaves. We spoke about the changes in weather and what this means for us and the different clothes we need to wear. As the weather turned cold they had great fun cracking the ice in our water tray to free the arctic animals, just like Stickman got stuck in the snow.

We cannot to wait to see what adventures

we have next term!

# Year 1

Year 1 were very fortunate to have some parents visit the classroom to talk about Diwali. They shared the story of Rama and Sita, and talked about why and how they celebrate the festival. The children learnt about the 5 days of Diwali and how each day is focussed on different aspects, and what the traditions are for celebrating each day. The children particularly enjoyed learning about the sweet foods that are shared!

Year 1 have also been learning how to refine their painting skills. We have learnt about a famous painter called Paul Klee who liked to use watercolour paints underneath black line designs. The children worked in small groups and went to different workstations to complete their worksheets. It was lovely to see the children from both classes working together to show their scientific knowledge.

# Naughty or Nice?!!!



History this half-term has continued with our Victorian learning and we have focused on important Victorians such as Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and John Macadam. We played the 'Mary Seacole Board Game' to help us learn facts for our fact file writing.



Geography this half term has been very fun filled and informative. The children have learnt about weather around the world including the United Kingdom. We have explored the differences between weather and climate and have looked at different climates around the world including a research lesson on The Arctic Circle. We used construction to build houses to suit different parts of the world and had to think carefully about the features that each house would have e.g. if it was a house over water it would need to be built on stilts. One of our Geography lessons involved the children becoming weather reporters and creating their own weather report based on the UK.

They worked in partners to write down their report using technical vocabulary they had learnt earlier on in the term e.g. westerly winds, partly cloudy and 80% chance of rain.

# Year 3 – Science and Our Brilliant Bodies

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

This term in Science, Year 3 have been learning all about bodies! We have learnt about different types of skeletons and how we move. We had great fun learning the names of the different bones in our bodies and can even use some of the proper scientific names – ask us to show you our femurs and vertebral columns! We used our DT skills to build working models of our arm muscles and we understand how the biceps and triceps work together to move our arms. As part of this unit, we also studied the components of a balanced diet and planned our own healthy meals. To finish our work on our bodies, we investigated the hypothesis that people with longer leg bones can jump further. To test this, we went outside and worked in small group to measure both the length of our femurs and then how far we could jump. We found out that our hypothesis was true!







Outside of the classroom, Year 3 have put their brilliant bodies to work in many different ways. We have been very proud to see so many of our children represent the school in various sporting events and the whole year group working together to complete 620 RIOT laps two weeks before the end of term, earning their reward of extra playtime. We are certainly in need of a good rest over Christmas!

# Year 4 Practical Geography Experiments

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

In Geography this half term Year 4 have loved looking at Oceans, The Water Cycle and Biomes.

When learning about the Water Cycle, we made our own mini version in class! First, we poured some water into a big, metal bowl and then we placed a small, empty plastic cup inside. We then wrapped the entire bowl in cling film and left it on a sunny (or not so sunny with the weather that we have had recently!) windowsill for five days. We were hoping that the water would show us that it had evaporated from the bowl, condensed on the cling film and precipitated into the cup.

When we looked at our experiment, Year 4 were extremely excited to see that it had worked! A small amount of the water had made its way into the once empty plastic cup. We discussed how this experiment was just like the Water Cycle on a much smaller scale and it was a lovely activity to show the children how it works in real life.



We also made our own clouds! We added lots of ice to a metal bowl and then added some warm water to a cup and rested it on top. After about 25 minutes we looked back at the cup and saw that there was steam coming out the top of it and condensation on the sides! We spoke about how this is similar to the way that clouds are formed in the sky. Year 5



# FORCES

This term in Year 5, we have particularly enjoyed our science topic, where we have had the opportunity to conduct many in-class investigations. We have learnt about different forces, such as, air resistance, gravity and friction. Our experiences have allowed us to make conclusions on the impact of these forces on the world around us. We have learnt about the process of investigating and how to record our findings, including using a hypothesis, prediction, method and fair test, to make sure that our experiments give us the correct data.

# Year 6

# Field trip to High Broom Woods

As the start of our new Geography topic in October, Year 6 set off in trepidation towards the back of the school field. Their excitement was palpable as we were accompanied by Mrs Page through the gate into the woods beyond.

The path took us towards the River Beck and we all stood on the iron bridge to observe the river environment and make sketches. Walking further into the woods, brought us to completely different surroundings, the children were then able to compare and contrast the two settings.

Our main aim was to take some measurements in a couple of other places to observe the features and location changes through a series of experiments.

When we reached a bend in an open expanse of the stream, all of the children expertly measured the width, depth, temperature and pH of the water in various positions and made a careful record of their results.

The main mission was the exciting task of measuring the speed at which the river was flowing. With a ten-metre length of soggy rope and a box of dog biscuits, each member of the class took turns to drop the dog biscuits into water and time the travel over the designated distance. Again, the results were shared and kept for examining later in the classroom.
